HOW IS IT DIFFERENT?




Restorative Justice (RJ) repairs harm done by an action.

The goal is to work with all individuals (harmed and accused) to come to a resolution.



Restoration can be achieved through restorative justice circles, mediation, conferences, conflict management and letter writing.



How can RJ be applied?

Restorative Justice can be applied with the code violations listed below:

- Physical Assault
- Bias Related Incidents
- Classroom Interruptions
- Roommate Conflicts
- ${\scriptstyle \bullet}$ Vandalism





Restorative Justice Approach

- Response identifies needs and responsibilities of all impacted parties
- Accountability = Understanding impact and repairing the harm
- Victim, offender and college community have a role in justice

vs.

Punitive Approach

- A college rule is broken
- Response is focused on establishing responsibility
- Accountability = Punishment
- Rules and intent outweigh whether outcome is positive/negative
